Description of collection: The manuscripts, all but one of which are in the Sultan Hamid collection, cover the fields of history, literature, Sufism, poetry, astrology, sciences, medicine, ethics, sermons, Arabic grammar, etc. The majority of the manuscripts were copied in the 13th century AH/19th century CE, but some date from the previous four centuries.

Total number of Islamic MSS: 367 (351 Arabic; 3 Persian; 7 Turkish; 6 Arabic/Turkish).

Description of collection: In 1987 the Institute of Oriental Culture of Tokyo University acquired a collection which previously belonged to the German scholar HANS DAIBER. The former owner had obtained the manuscripts in the course of his travels to the Middle East, mostly from Syria, Turkey and Yemen. However, the manuscripts originated from Lebanon, Iraq, Pakistan and India. The oldest MS. is dated 551AH/1156 CE. The rest cover a period from the 12th to the 20th century; half of them are from the 18th century.

The MSS cover the following topics: Sufism, theology, belief, devotional writings, poetry, sermons, the history of Islamic sects, Islamic law, particularly the Ḥanafī school, ethics, philosophy, psychology, logic, medicine, occult sciences, mathematics (trigonometry and geometry), the astrolabe, eschatology, *tafsīr*, recitation of the Qurʾān, history and biography, grammar and literature.

There are several new and unique MSS in the collection which “are not mentioned in Brockelmann’s GAL, nor in Sezgin’s GAS and Kaḥḥāla’s *Muʿjam al-muʾallifīn*”, according to HANS DAIBER. Noteworthy rarities are two copies of *Risāla fī anwāʿ al-mashrūʿāt*, a comprehensive treatise on the terminology of jurisprudence, by LUṬF ALLĀH AL-KAYDĀNĪ (died 1349).
